Diamond Jubilee and Brombara Celebration

The 11.45 am Mass on 17th October was very well attended by our whole Scout Group, many past members, the Guides and Brownies and representatives from our District and County. Fr. Jack Thora began Mass by saying, "Though this is my first visit to Bromley, your welcome and your living links with Mbarara where I have spent so many years as a White Father Missionary, make me feel as though I have 'come home'. During the celebration we reflected on our friendship and achievements over the last sixty years that laid the foundations of our very successful Brombara Project.

We met in the Hall afterwards for a buffet lunch and presentations of awards and certificates. Many congratulations to Simon Joyce who received the Chief Scout Award from our District Commissioner. Frances Poulson, County Commissioner, then presented all

members of the Scout Group, the Guides and Brownies with the International Friendship Award badges and certificates. I believe this is the first time that Guides and Scouts have been able to receive the same badge and award. I hope it won't be the last. The Award is given for joint work for a developing country. It entailed all sections working together, learning about Uganda and fundraising for the project. I know a lot of hard work went into this and I must thank all the leaders and parents for their commitment to the project. Those present enjoyed viewing photos and mementoes of Uganda and other Group items.

A slide presentation has since been assembled and shown to all sections in the parish beginning with our reunion one

very cold January evening in an unheated hall. However it was good to be together again – the first occasion since leaving Heathrow on our return. Terry displayed the tools and implements used in Uganda: such as a local shovel and a panga. He has not yet constructed the washing machine for Brenda! We have had great exchanges of photographs and diaries.

Mbarara - Good news at last!

We have just heard from Pascal and Nkabakyenga that the Scouts have been granted a 20-year lease on the land for the River Rwizi campsite. The written agreement has yet to be completed but we are very hopeful that the Scouts and Guides of Mbarara District can now proceed with developing the site as originally planned in our project.

This year's summer camp at Downe is fast approaching. 18 Scouts, 3 Ventures and 3 leaders from the 11th Bromley will be attending the international camp from 27th July to 5th August and most important of all – we will be joined by Pascal, Julius and 8 Scouts from



Mbarara. We will all be on Saturn sub-camp together with groups from Sweden, Norway, Switzerland, the U.S.A and many others from the UK.

Pascal has been working very hard to ensure everything is attended to in good time and they already have their passports and visas - purchased with borrowed money. They will all have medicals and yellow fever vaccinations before coming and will be attending at least two training camps, just as we did before our trip out. He is also arranging for a 'send-off' ceremony and welcome home party complete, with T.V. and press coverage. This is a really special adventure for them all.

They arrive in Gatwick, U.K. on Wednesday morning 26th July landing at 4.55am. We will bring them to Wilberforce [courtesy of Bromley District] where they will be able to rest up after their long journey. I hope that some of you will be able to come during the afternoon or evening to meet our friends and to share a meal with them on the first night. They will go to the Camp with us on the following day. They will be there until 5th August. Each Ugandan will then be the guest of a Bromley family for two nights before flying out on 7th August. I hope that many people will be able to meet them after Mass on Sunday 6th August.

Brombara - Ugandan Visitors:

Ngaro K. Pascal Scout Leader of the Mbarara team. He is married to Annette with a son Alex who will be one in June. He has been teaching at St. Lawrence Primary School since 1989. 
interested in athletics. He is looking forward to his trip to U.K. 'to make new friends, see big tall buildings and to learn how to put up tents'.
